

COVID-19 media surveillance

Coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19) caused by severe acute respiratory syndrome coronavirus 2 (SARS-CoV-2) remains a mayor news topic, with over 90 thousand articles per day on Wednesday (in 70 languages, as detected by [MEDISYS](#)).

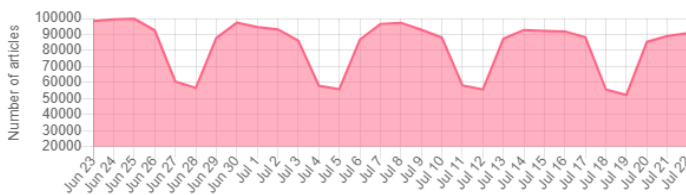


Figure 1 Media reports on Covid-19 (source: EMM/MEDISYS)

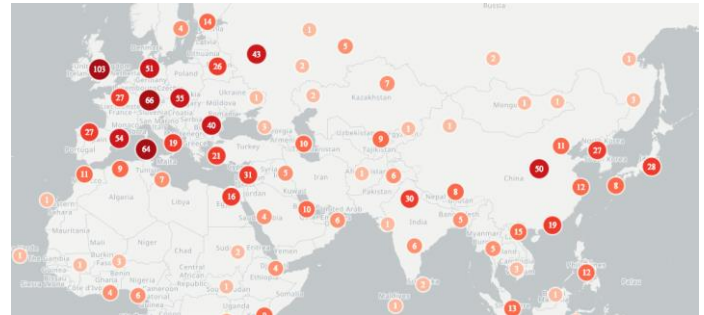


Figure 2 Geolocations mentioned in coronavirus media reports showing clusters of media reports on Italy, France, Spain, Germany, the UK, Russia, India, China, South Korea and Japan (source: EMM/MEDISYS)

Fact Check

Fact checked: health-related claims

- Fact checkers debunk claims, shared, among others, by Instagram influencers, that masks do not help to reduce coronavirus transmission ([estadaoverifica](#)) and claims that masks are even dangerous given that they cause decreased oxygen intake and increased "toxic inhalation" ([boomlive](#)).
- Fact checkers debunk a series of false COVID-19 cures, including eucalyptus ([newtral](#)), cabbage ([factcheck.kz](#)) and a mixture of pepper, honey and ginger ([aosfatos](#)).

Fact checked: anti-vax narratives

- Fact checkers debunk claims from Russian news sites that the US has started testing a COVID-19 vaccine on its armed forces and there are already victims and that US virologists have arrived in Ukraine to test a COVID-19 vaccine on the Ukrainian population ([stopfake](#)).
- Fact checkers debunk claims that the new COVID-19 vaccine contains "replicable digitisable RNA" that is activated by 5G technology and causes the virus to "reactivate" ([afpfactual](#)).

Fact checked: conspiracy theories

- Fact checkers debunk claims that COVID-19 tests have been tainted with coronavirus for "many months" in an attempt to spread the virus ([aapfactcheck](#)).
- Fact checkers debunk several claims made by David Icke in the course of a two-hour interview published in April 2020. Among the debunked claims are: RT-PCR tests cannot detect the virus, anyone with flu-like symptoms is diagnosed as with COVID-19, Wuhan was the first Chinese city to introduce 5G, just before the outbreak ([afpfactual](#)).
- Fact checkers debunk claims that "Operation Lockstep" - a document allegedly released by the Rockefeller Foundation - shows how global elites planned the COVID-19 pandemic for the last 10 years in order to implement a police state ([snopes](#)).
