COVID-19 media surveillance

23 June 2020; 15:30

Coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19) caused by severe acute respiratory syndrome coronavirus 2 (SARS-CoV-2) is dominating the news, with nearly 100 thousand articles per day on Monday (in 70 languages, as detected by MEDISYS).

- USA: half of US states see coronavirus surge as officials warn first wave far from over; despite surge in coronavirus cases, USA continues to open up
- Brazil registers 21,432 additional cases and 654 deaths
- UK's confirmed cases fall to pre-lockdown level
- Spain reports 12 active coronavirus outbreaks with Aragón returning to Phase 2 of the deescalation plan
- Germany: lockdown measures for Gütersloh district with more than 7,000 employees of a meat processing plant under quarantine

Fact checked: health-related claims

- Fact checkers debunk misleading claims about the health risks of face masks, including claims that wearing face masks is dangerous because it leads to "re-breathing your exhaled CO2", reporting that carbon dioxide molecules are tiny - far smaller than droplets containing coronavirus which the masks are designed to stop - and will not be trapped by a breathable material (bbcrealitycheck).
- Fact checkers debunk a video in which a self-proclaimed researcher claims that the coronavirus will disappear after the solar eclipse of 21 June, reporting that the video comes from a satirical channel (<u>fatabyyano</u>).

Fact checked: conspiracy theories

- Fact checkers debunk claims that Nobel laureate Dr Denis Mukwege resigned from a Democratic Republic of the Congo COVID-19 response team because they were ordered to declare all deaths COVID-19 death, reporting that in his resignation letter, he blamed the country's organisational problems, outpaced strategy and slow testing (africacheck, foots)
- Fact checkers debunk claims that a peer-reviewed research paper says that the new coronavirus has been artificially engineered, reporting that a Norwegian virologist has made claims about the non-natural origins of the new coronavirus, but this claim is not in a new peer-reviewed paper he coauthored and the scientific community widely agrees that the virus was not artificially engineered (fullfact).

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
