COVID-19 media surveillance

1 April 2021; 22:30 weekly brief

Coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19) caused by severe acute respiratory syndrome coronavirus 2 (SARS-CoV-2) remains a mayor news topic, with over 75 thousand articles per day (in 70 languages, as detected by EMM/MEDISYS).

- US: signs of fourth wave as thousands of cases of the B.1.1.7 strain have been reported; close to 100 million Americans have received at least one dose of the vaccine
- Brazil faces health system collapse as covid-19 cases skyrocket
- Spain: fourth wave feared as country is on level three of its four-stage alert system
- France could hit the <u>peak of the third wave in 7 to 10 days</u> according to Health Minister Olivier Veran; President <u>Macron announced nationwide</u> lockdown
- Italy to remain in <u>partial lockdown until end of April</u>; vaccination made <u>mandatory for all health workers</u>
- Poland has extended vaccine availability to the over-40s, but later restricted online registrations
- Sweden to offer all adults <u>first vaccine shot by August 15</u>, later than planned
- Belgium: Police dispersed 2,000 people at Belgian April Fool party in the Bois de la Cambre park
- Luxembourg: Parliament votes to reopen terraces even as cases rise
- Egypt received 854,400 vaccine doses shipped by COVAX
- Israel: active COVID-19 cases drop to lowest level since June 2020
- India speeds up vaccinations as cases soar again
- New Zealand reported <u>five border-related cases in managed isolation</u>
- China's Yunnan Province reported six new cases on Wednesday
- Japan: Olympic organizers denied rumours that Osaka torch relay has been cancelled due to spike of cases



523 articles from unverified sources were selected forming 9 supernarratives over the last week:





- Fact checkers debunk claims that the Pfizer CEO refused the COVID-19
 vaccine, reporting that the claims are based on an interview that took place
 on 14 December 2020 and that he has received the vaccine in the
 meantime (usatoday).
- Fact checkers debunk a COVID-19 vaccine "Q&A" sheet, which has been circulating on social media, spreading claims that mRNA COVID-19 vaccines are experimental, have not been tested on animals, have not been subject to medium or long term safety testing on humans, and others suggesting that mRNA COVID-19 vaccines may be dangerous (fullfact).
- Fact checkers debunk claims that COVID-19 vaccines are "barcodes for life" as they are used to identify and track people (rappler).
