Coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19) caused by severe acute respiratory syndrome coronavirus 2 (SARS-CoV-2) remains a major news topic, with 80 thousand articles per day (in 70 languages, as detected by [EMM/MEDISYS](#)).


The most mentioned English sources were the New York Times, the Guardian and AP News.

570 articles from unverified sources were selected forming 9 supernarratives over the last week:



Fact Check

- Fact checkers address claims that the AstraZeneca COVID-19 vaccine causes blood clots, reporting that while the matter is still under review, as of now there is no evidence in support of such claims ([snopes](#)).
- Fact checkers debunk claims that Marvin Hagler's death was caused by COVID-19 vaccination, reporting that the boxing champion's death occurred nearly three weeks after he received his vaccination and has not been ruled vaccine-related ([usatoday](#)).
- Fact checkers debunk claims that there is a tracking chip inside the COVID-19 vaccine, reporting that while there is a radio-frequency identification chip on the outside of some syringes, it is there to track vaccine doses, not people ([poynter](#)).
